Our Why

Sobering Statistics

RIGHT NOW, OVER 9,000 PEOPLE ARE HOMELESS.
AND THAT IS JUST HERE, IN MARICOPA COUNTY.*

- 56% of those people are sleeping on the streets with no access to basic needs, a 22% increase in the past year.
- Nearly 2,000 children and their families are impacted by these sobering realities.

These heartbreaking statistics are why we are so passionate about our mission here at House of Refuge Sunnyslope. Here, those experiencing homelessness are given opportunities to rebuild their life. Your partnership helps us provide housing, meals, fellowship, and career services. Everything our residents need to beat homelessness.

WHERE WE FIT AND HOW WE SERVE.

The 4 Phases of Homelessness

Phase 1: Hidden

When someone is temporarily living with others (or 'couch-surfing') with friends or relatives because they lack other housing opportunities.

Phase 2: Transitional

When someone is currently in a shelter or temporary housing program for a specific time.

Phase 3: Episodic

When someone is currently homeless and has experienced at least three periods of homelessness in the previous year.

Phase 4: Chronic

When someone is continuously homeless for a year or more or has had a minimum of four episodes of homelessness in the previous three years. House of Refuge Sunnyslope serves those in the most prevalent category of homelessness: transitional. People in this phase of homelessness have often been hit with a catastrophic life event or sudden life change. This can be due to a life of addiction, job loss or domestic violence just to mention a few of many different circumstances.

By reaching those in phase 2, we can help prevent the decline into deeper homelessness. Our Vision for Victory methodology has helped thousands of individuals in transitional homelessness find their pathway to a sustainable life.



A plan to experience a resilient, Christ-focused and thriving life

VISION FOR VICTORY



HOW WE WALK THAT VISION OUT:

Love

We welcome all who desire a place to live, have the ability to work, and a desire for Vision for Victory in their life. We share God's love through multiple Bible studies throughout the week where mentors are paired up with residents to walk alongside them and point them to Christ.

House

We provide Christ-centered housing through three programs: Working Men, Working Women, and Working Moms and their Children. They work full-time and pay program fees at a subsidized rate. The residential stay of 1-2 years allows them time to work on their Vision for Victory, a plan to experience a resilient, Christ-focused, and thriving life.

Equip

Beginning their first month, we identify residents' needs through case management to equip them with the right services, and we work with them on their Vision for Victory plan to successfully move on from our program. We partner with agencies such as AZ at Work and St. Joseph the Worker to quickly equip residents with full-time jobs. Beyond work, we also teach life skills like budgeting and relationship boundaries. Residents in good standing also have access to dental, scholarships, career and counseling programs. We also provide spiritual equipping through Bible studies and volunteer mentors.



ALUMNI PROGRAM

A year ago, the Alumni program was created as another step towards independence. Residents who qualify may extend their stay for an additional 6 months while establishing their own utility accounts, paying a deposit, and applying for more permanent housing, all while staying connected to our program. The additional 6 months has enabled alumni residents to secure apartments and houses, obtain vehicles, reconcile with family, increase income, and save money. In 2023 we were

able to provide stable alumni housing for 13 individuals.



DANIEL ALUMNI PROGRAM 2023

Daniel expressed that "the benefit of Alumni housing was having more freedom to put into practice the disciplines I learned over the past year through Bible studies and case management". Daniel used his time in Alumni housing to reinstate his driving license, purchase a car, and find a home to rent - setting himself up for a more stabilized life.



STEPHANIE

When Stepanie moved into House of Refuge Women's Program with her four children, she had a job working in a group home. The home was shut down and she lost her job. She then took a cleaning job to meet program requirements. Later she got a better job at Recovery Innovations as a Behavioral Health Tech. She is thriving as a full-time employee. She describes this her dream job and she loves it. She's even mentioned that someday she hopes to work here at HRS. .

YOUR A-B-C GUIDE TO EMPLOYMENT SUCCESS

HRS requires that all residents secure full-time employment. Many have not worked in quite some time, however, we encourage them to embrace the A-B-Cs of employment, which are: A – find A job, though it might not be your ideal situation, a job is key to your future success. Secondly, get a Better job. Having a job shows that you are employable and marketable. And finally, begin working on your Career job. Often, having stabilized housing and a good job are predicates for career advancement. This takes the form of returning to a field that was once jeopardized, attending vocational training, and advancing into leadership at their present job.

CHRIST-CENTERED CASE MANAGEMENT FOR GOAL ACHIEVEMENT

Ours is a Christ-centered case management approach that ensures that our residents have a significant say in identifying goals and service needs and that there is shared accountability. Our case management begins at the initial screening, assessment, then intake. Our case managers conduct regular case management to provide tools, resources, and guidance to our residents to achieve the goals they have agreed to accomplish at intake. We have added case management software to make the process more efficient as we collaborate on the goal of housing stabilization and spiritual development.



KETA'S STORY

Keta became very active in her own case management goals. She focused on financial stability and through time with her case manager and a volunteer, she set a plan to purchase a car by developing a budget, saving money, and patiently waiting. She was able to purchase a car for cash and avoided a costly auto loan. She is now working with the same volunteer to prepare to purchase a home in the future.

ROB & CHRIS

After a few months at HRS, Rob (right) attended a Men's Retreat, stepped up at an altar call, and shared that he had experienced the worst year of his life. Chris was drawn to his story and began volunteering and him every Thursday night until Rob successfully completed our program. "Chris becoming my mentor made a huge impact on my life." Chris reminds us that mentoring provides blessings both ways – "It is a brotherhood unlike any other I have experienced, and I get to be part of it. Thank you, Lord!"

BUILDING CONNECTIONS: THE IMPACT OF VOLUNTEER MENTORS IN COMMUNITY REINTEGRATION

Volunteer mentors are a critical piece of the embrace we give our residents. At the end of 2023 we had 43 mentors paired up one on one with our residents. Mentors in many cases are the first person to reconnect our residents with the community that was lost due to drug and alcohol addiction, prison, divorce, and domestic violence. During the year we held two sessions called "Mentoring Reimagined" to train and develop our current and new volunteers.

RESIDENTS EQUIPPED TO SERVE OTHERS

In my role as Director of
Programming, I felt that it was
critical to add a "serving piece" to
our case management process.
.Typically, case management
focuses on the individual and
their progress towards housing
stabilization.



However, while receiving services from case managers, volunteers, and mentors I felt that it was important to not allow these services to our residents to create an entitlement or dependency culture. To that end, we encourage our residents to be of service to others. In 2023, as a group, our men, women, and children engaged in serving for Feed My Starving Children and Food for the Hungry. As a result, several residents felt compelled to organize their own local outreach efforts and proceeded to feed, clothe, and provide resources to the homeless in several parks throughout Phoenix - in some cases, a park where they once stayed while living in their cars. Paying it forward!








KASHIEF'S RETURN


344 men, women, and children were provided Christ-centered housing (33% Increase from 2022)



OUR MINISTRY PARTNERING TO FEED THE VALLEY


There are many ways we strive to be good stewards of the provisions God gives us and sharing bountiful food with others has been a long standing tradition of House of Refuge Sunnyslope.



Our instrumental partnership with St. Mary's Foodbank allows our team of volunteers to capture food 10 times weekly that would otherwise go to waste.



This allows us to feed 100+ residents daily and keeps our kitchens stocked for our volunteer cooks. The abundance of rescued food enables us to support nonprofit organizations across the valley. This collaborative approach makes our partnership a win-win.

Roland's Story

YOU AND I OWE A DEBT OF GRATITUDE TO ROLAND.

Upon his release, a paperwork error redirected him to the House of Refuge Sunnyslope, where he discovered a transformative program centered on resilience and faith.

Embracing this new chapter, Roland emerged from his past struggles with a renewed sense of purpose. He dedicated himself to helping fellow veterans, serving as commander of a Disabled American Veterans chapter and contributing to nonprofit organizations focused on housing for disabled vets. Roland's tireless efforts have brought hope and opportunity to many, echoing his own journey of redemption and demonstrating the power of second chances.



Jake's Story

FROM DARKNESS TO REDEMPTION: JAKE'S JOURNEY OF FAITH-BASED RECOVERY

Jake endured 15 tumultuous years trapped in addiction, cycling through various recovery programs with little success. Despite his desperation for change, he found himself repeatedly falling back into darkness. It wasn't until he checked into a faith-based recovery program that Jake experienced a true breakthrough. The transformative power of God's love took hold of his life, leading him on a path of renewal and redemption.

However, even with newfound hope, Jake feared returning to the outside world alone. Thanks to the support of House of Refuge Sunnyslope and their Vision for Victory program, he found the guidance and structure he needed to rebuild his life.
